FLARE DEMO A SOARING HIT!

The 9th annual CPS Halifax Flare Demo took place the evening of May 2, 2007, aboard the vessel New Dawn III, chartered from New Dawn Charters, which is owned and operated by CPS member and instructor, Andrea MacDonald.

The flare demo went very, very well! Everyone aboard really enjoyed themselves and they learned a lot about distress signaling. Brian Elson and Keily Samson of the Office of Boating Safety, who conducted the demo, commented that it was more like a real distress situation, being on a boat that was rocking, close quarters, etc. They were very impressed with the entire event and how well it went off (no pun intended!).

Flare Demo, continued -

The weather was perfect for us as well...we couldn't have ordered a better night if we tried. Seas were calm, winds were light and there was a big full moon out when we were steaming back in.

In addition to the flare demo, boating students spent the steaming time looking at buoys and trying to figure out the correct paths to take. They listened to New Dawn's radio transmissions, checked out the radar and how things look on it, the plotter, and the depth sounder.

They also got to see the effects of the city lights when trying to visually pick out the buoys in the darkness, and were able to experience going through a mooring field in the dark and coming alongside a wharf in the dark. It's all very well to discuss navigating at night or in reduced visibility while sitting in a classroom, but there's nothing like seeing it for yourself in order to fully understand what the teacher is talking about.

There were 25 people on board, including Office of Boating Safety facilitators Brian Elson and Keily Samson, Captain Andrea MacDonald, crew Brittany Briggs and 21 enthusiastic flare demo participants.

The whole trip was a great success. In fact, so much so that we'll do it again, Wednesday, May 30, rain date, Wednesday June 6. See below for how to register. We'll need at least 10 people to run the event, with a maximum of 20. Register ASAP to avoid disappointment! Don't wait until you need a flare to learn how to use one! Like anchoring, it looks simple, but there's more to it than meets the eye.



This month's pick is a solo sailor's webpage that details his recent purchase and complete refurbishment of a 28' sailboat. Fred Bickum is now somewhere near Australia, on the way to completing a planned circumnavigation. His website is fairly well organized and gives some nice photos and descriptions of various projects he undertook, some of them quite major - such as the fabrication of a completely new rudder design to facilitate self-steering gear that he built himself.

There is also an interesting autobiographical area that outlines his first exposure to sailing, along with various interesting experiences throughout his life.



Fred even makes reference to something I remember from my childhood: an offer from an American tobacco company to sell a small sailboat for \$88 plus a number of end flaps from Kool cigarette cartons. Although none of my family were smokers, my mom worked at the military Base Exchange at the time and had ample access to cigarette carton end flaps, so I ended up buying one of the Kool sailboats!

Another neat treat is the ability to click on a link that shows, via satellite uplink, Fred's current position. The technology that we now have available to the average boater at modest cost is quite amazing.

TRUE VS. MAGNETIC

A motion was made at a recent Curriculum Committee meeting; they are to discuss the consequences of labelling course lines with Magnetic headings rather than True as most boaters need a Magnetic heading to steer their boat. The committee is to bring their recommendation to the October 2007 Training meeting. The discussion went on to say True bearings can still be used for exam, chartwork and study work but when actually used on one's boat, they recommend plotting course lines be marked Magnetic. This is safer as once plotted, headings can be read right off the chart without the need to do any calculation from True to Magnetic.

NEW COURTESY CHECK PROGRAMME COMING!

A Memorandum of Understanding has been reached with the Office of Boating Safety. It has now been announced that a few sites in Atlantic Canada (including Halifax) will be the first to engage in a new "courtesy check" programme. This is similar to Coast Guard Auxiliary courtesy inspections of the past, but

now CPS will be playing a key role in this new programme. The courtesy check programme will provide training for CPS members who wish to perform this service for the boating community. Look for details on our website this summer, and contact Dan White at dewhite@eastlink.ca if you are interested.
